Facilities Timeline & Process

CG Schmidt and Plunkett Raysich, the district's design/build contractor, presented to the School Board at the November 18 School Board meeting on the timeline and process for the design work regarding the combined MS/HS facility. They will update the Board each month moving forward on the construction project. Staff members from the middle school and high school met with architects in November to further develop the design for the new facility. Several staff members also traveled with the architects in December to visit new or newly renovated schools in the state. Two facilities update sessions will be provided this winter for community members to review the actual plans prior to construction, which is projected to begin in April 2015. The new additions are scheduled to be complete by August 2015 so high school staff and students can move into the space prior to the start of the 2015-16 school year. Renovation on the existing school will then begin. Middle school staff and students will be in their new space for the start of the 2016-17 school year.

School Calendar Set for 2015-16

The Ripon Board of Education approved the school calendar for next year at its November meeting. The calendar is posted on the school district's website. The Board is sensitive to vacation planning and makes certain the next year's calendar is always completed prior to January 1.

The 2014 Summer School dates will be approved at the Board's January meeting and will also be posted to the District's website to allow families to plan their vacations accordingly. Typically, the Summer School session runs for five weeks from mid-June to mid-July. Each year summer school offers an opportunity for students to receive remediation and enrichment.

As Wisconsin moves toward creating a more balanced assessment system to measure higher standards for achievement, students around the state find themselves immersed in a more rigorous testing schedule. This balanced system offers a continuous series of different assessments designed to inform and evaluate the teaching and learning cycle throughout the year. While the last edition highlighted the changes in assessments that high school students will participate in, this article will focus on the various assessments given to students at the elementary and primary levels during the 2014-15 school year.

STAR Assessments are computer-adaptive tests that measure students' ability in reading and math. They are administered to students in grades kindergarten through 12. These assessments will provide teachers with useful data to guide their students' instruction and monitor their progress. STAR assessments will be administered in Sep-

tember, January, and early May.

The Phonological Awareness Literacy Screening (PALS) provides a comprehensive assessment of young children's knowledge of literacy fundamentals that are predictive of future reading success. This year, students in grades 1 and 2 will be assessed in September and students in grades 4K and K will be assessed in mid October. Teachers may administer the PALS assessment mid-year to allow for progress monitoring. All students in grades 4K through 2 will be assessed again in May to determine academic growth.

Assessment of English Learners (ELs), including immigrant students and ELs with disabilities, are required to participate in all state or federally required language and academic content assessments. Students in 4K to grade 12 will participate in the ACCESS testing during the months of December and January.

The Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Examination (WKCE) will be administered to students in grades 4, 8, and 10. This fall assessment will measure students' knowledge in the areas of Science and Social Studies. Math, Reading, and Language Arts will now be measured by Wisconsin's new Smarter Balanced Assessment, the Badger Exam.

The Badger Exam 3-8 is Wisconsin's Smarter Balanced Assessment. In 2010, Wisconsin elected to join the Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium, formed to help establish a series of "next generation assessments" that are aligned to the Common Core State Standards to measure students' career and college readiness. The Badger Exam will replace existing tests in English and math for grades 3-8 and will be administered in the spring.

There are many ways that we can prepare and support our children in these assessments. As parents, you can stay informed and involved in your child's education throughout the year. Become familiar with the Common Core State Standards by visiting www. pta.org/parentsguide. Take advantage of practice test opportunities provided by your child's teachers. Monitor your child's progress and work with his or her teacher to discuss opportunities that will enhance your child's learning experience. Keep in mind that your child's education is a team effort. We must all work together to ensure that our children are achieving their maximum levels of proficiency.

Outstanding Recognition Achievement

Ripon Education Foundation Funds Three Innovative Teaching Grants

The Ripon Education Foundation has announced three recipients of its 2014-2015 Innovative Teaching Grants totaling \$3994. Jeanne Hall, 6th grade teacher at Ripon Middle School received \$500 to support a sixth-grade project called "Culture and Tastes of the Western Hemisphere." This cross-curricular and hands-on grant will enable sixth grade students to each create a





"Cultures and Tastes of the Western Hemisphere" book with a chapter for each of the major cultures students study during the year, as well as food preparation and tasting events with assistance from Briony Storz of the district's food service.

Nick Goeldi, science teacher at Ripon High School, submitted a \$1064 proposal to support an "Energy in Science Project."The high school physics department will use the money to purchase two Vernier wind kits for use in the energy conservation units.

Jeanne Shohoney, World Language teacher at Ripon High School, requested \$2440 to assist the World Languages department to attend a week-long national conference on Teaching Proficiency through Reading and Storytelling (TPRS) language instruction near Washington, D.C. in July 2015.

Since its founding, the Foundation has awarded over \$196,500 in grants supporting college scholarships, innovative teaching and learning, and elementary tutoring. The Foundation also assists with RHS Reunions and acts as fiscal agent for Ripon's Art Presenter and High Mileage Vehicle Competition programs. Funding for these grants comes from generous Ripon area donors.

Jack Frank was recognized for his contribution as the Art Presenter Program Coordinator since his retirement from teaching 22 years ago.



Bjorn Hauge was recognized for being named a National Merit Scholarship program semi-finalist.
