Inclusive Playground Symbol of Unification



The Murray Park and Quest school community is fundraising for a new, inclusive playground—a symbol of unity and growth to celebrate combining the two schools. The annual student-grown plant sale in May is one way families can support the effort.

Replacing equipment original to the building with a safe and modern play space has become a top priority. "This unification has been about more than combining buildings—it's about creating a new, shared identity," said Principal Jessi Johnson. "We want the playground to be a symbol of that unity and a place where all students feel welcome." The new playground will serve as a central hub for fun, friendship, and physical activity, helping students connect and journey together.



Preliminary Budget for 2025-2026

The 2025-2026 preliminary budget plan reduces expenditures and maintains a balanced budget while minimizing impacts on students. Given that Wisconsin's Biennial Budget for 2025-2027 determines most state and local revenue and is historically finalized after the school district must commit to teaching positions and vendor contracts, the District uses conservative projections and estimates each spring as it works to develop a balanced budget. This year, the District is projecting an increase in revenue limit funding and in per pupil categorical aid along with increases in open-enrollment tuition, the completion of Fund 38 debt payments, and new personal property aid to offset the expiration of ESSER III funds. This leaves an overall decrease of \$179,151 which the District has been able to account for through staffing changes and department budget adjustments.

Service & Partnership

Education Foundation Provides Composer

The Ripon Education Foundation (REF) was part of the Music in Our Schools event on March 11, 2025, to highlight their support of the music arts in our schools. The concert featured choir and band performances from students in grades 5-12. Donations to the REF collected at the concert will be used to commission a composer to write a combined piece for the students to perform at the March 2026 concert. The music department also plans purchase to а portable sound system for when students travel around the community to perform.





New Chapter Ingalls Field



Ingalls Field will enter a new era as Ripon College's new Hopp Stadium spurs an official end to the long-standing agreement between the District and College. The agreement, which dates back to 1967, created an option for both organizations to use and maintain the field. With the opening of Hopp Stadium, Ripon College made their final payment under the agreement and notified the District to officially release its reversionary interest in Field. This marks Ingalls an important historic moment for both Ingalls Field, formerly schools. known as Ingalls Park, retains a prominent history in the City of Ripon. For decades, it has hosted both Ripon High School and Ripon College student athletic events, particularly football, track, and, more recently, soccer. In the absence of a new agreement, the two schools will be able to utilize each other's Facility Rental Fee Structure. At some point in the future, either or both schools could initiate conversation about a new agreement if the volume of use of each other's facilities warrants it.
