From the Superintendent's Desk



As the 2014-15 school year concludes, many highlights come to mind. The year was filled with success stories and also important foundational work to build on moving forward into next year. It has been a very historic school year in many ways.

With the passing of a 29.1 million facility referendum in November 2014 by a 2-1 margin the district broke ground on the 6-12 facility this spring. The additions and renovations to the existing high school building provide for modern learning spaces. The facility project will be completed in August 2016.

New curriculum resources, made possible through the operational referendum, will be available for students in the fall. These resources include new reading materials to align with the writing materials that were implemented this past year. Students will also have access to new hands-on science and engineering resources.

In addition to being a top rated district based on our state report cards, US News & World Report recognize Ripon High School and Lumen as top ranked high schools in the country. Both RHS and Lumen received bronze ratings.

Earlier this school year, Ripon was named by Nerdwallet as a top ten Best Cities for Young Families in Wisconsin. The distinction is based on communities that offer the best combination of solid schools, great neighbors, and affordability. RASD is proud to be part of the reason Ripon received this recognition.

In a partnership with the UW-Colleges system, I traveled with leaders from Ripon and three other Wisconsin school districts to China for 10 days this spring to establish a pathway for international tuition paying students from China to earn a diploma in Ripon. Goals of the program include bringing international diversity, permitting greater study abroad opportunities, augmenting declining enrollments, and providing additional revenue to the district.

These are just some of the many accomplishments for which we can all take great pride and there are many more accomplishments ahead. A strategic planning team comprised of stakeholders from across the district and community met on Wednesday evenings for the past three months to set the course for the district over the next five years. The final draft of the vision, mission and strategic objectives has been submitted to the Board for their approval.

Thank you for a great 2014-15 school year!! Ripon Area School District is affecting the lives of our students and their futures. We are truly investing today for our tomorrow.

Facilities Update

At the May meeting, the Board of Education reviewed the first internal renderings of the 6-12 facility. The construction of the middle and high school facility was approved by voters at the November 2014 referendum and construction officially began with a groundbreaking in April 2015.

The phasing of the project work is planned heavily for the summer months over the next two years to minimize disruptions to class time, school events and normal operations. The work areas will be separated from the student areas to maximize safety and security for the students and staff.

Beginning in July 2015, Ripon High School will have a temporary main entrance on the south side of the existing building. Students, parents and community members will access this entrance from the new south parking lot and will utilize this entrance through April 2016 when the additions to the west side of the facility are complete.



Superintendent Dr. Mary Whitrock, Curriculum Director Christine Damm, and Social Studies Teacher Rick Kelm traveled recently with a state-wide delegation to establish international partnerships with public high schools and universities in the cities of Yancheng and Zhangjiagang in the Jiangsu Providence of China.

RHS & LHS Named Top High Schools

US News & World Report recognize Ripon High School and Lumen High School as top ranked high schools in the country. Both RHS and Lumen received bronze ratings. The 2015 Best High Schools rankings highlight top-performing public schools on a state and national level. The 2015 rankings include data on more than 21,150 public high schools. In this year's edition of Best High Schools, 6,517 schools received medals. A three-step process determined the Best High Schools. The first two steps ensured that the schools serve all of their students well, using their performance on the math and reading parts of their state proficiency tests as the benchmarks. For those schools that made it past the first two steps, a third step assessed the degree to which schools prepare students for college-level work. In the 2015 U.S. News & World Report Best High Schools rankings, 57 Wisconsin schools earned silver medals and 83 were awarded bronze.

French Adventure

Twenty-one French 5th graders from Paris, France were greeted with a warm welcome from the American host families on May 5th. They were accompanied by their teachers Katy Renard and Alain Buchheit and arrived in Ripon, on May 5th. The group stayed with host families throughout the Ripon community from May 5th to May 25th. Six students and three teachers will be going back to France from June 11th to June 28th.

The French Adventure exchange program is a year long project for the French children. From September to January the French children were busy improving their English and learning about American culture. The French and American children were matched up in January and phase two of the project began. The families exchanged emails, letters, phone calls, video conferences and got to know each other.

Not only were they integrated into the activities on our school campus, but the French students led cooking and dancing activities and ball games with the American students. They also were able to go on numerous field trips that enabled them to further learn and appreciate American culture.

This project is really about opening up to a different culture, about taking initiatives, and about working together on a common goal.



Curriculum Corner - Part 1 of 2

Ripon Area School District students in grades 4PS-8 will be receiving a more balanced approach in literacy instruction beginning with the 2015-16 school year. Teachers will be gathering throughout the summer to prepare for this shift in teaching and learning. The purpose of this month's article is to provide you with answers to questions you may have about this reading philosophy.

Question: What is a balanced literacy approach – balancing what?

Answer: The balanced literacy approach is not a program that you find in a box, but rather a philosophy and structure to support literacy - reading and writing learning - in the classroom. A balanced literacy approach balances the many aspects of high quality literacy instruction. These include: whole group, small group and individual teaching settings, instruction in reading and writing, the use and access to fiction and nonfiction texts, as well as direct teaching and independent practice. In a balanced literacy approach teachers operate through these multiple environments using various approaches that differ in support from modeling and demonstration by the teacher to students taking independent control over their learning and work through a gradual release of responsibility.

Question: What are the specific components of a balanced literacy classroom?

Answer: If you visited a balanced literacy classroom some of the activities you might see would include: interactive read alouds, small group guided reading, students reading self-selected books independently, the teacher conferring one-on-one with students, shared reading (the teacher and students reading together to build fluency and word recognition), modeled writing, shared writing (the teacher and students writing together to build phonics and spelling skills), and independent writing.

Question: What materials are used in a balanced literacy classroom?

Answer: In a balanced literacy classroom the most important materials are books! Teachers use high quality books as mentor texts. These are books that teachers and students come back to often to analyze the theme, use the text as a model of good writing, practice their favorite parts to build fluency, examine the structure of the text and how it was crafted to help learn more about how all kinds of texts work. A teacher working in a balanced literacy classroom has access to leveled guided reading books. These books are leveled using the text continuum developed by Fountas and Pinnell. It has become the standard measure for leveling books according to the structure and features of the text. A small group of students would work with the teacher to gain the skills needed to read books at a certain level and build their knowledge to move forward as a reader. A balanced literacy classroom also has an extensive classroom library. Many of the books the students will read during their independent reading time will come from the classroom library. The libraries should contain books of various levels and many topics including fiction and nonfiction selections. These are the most important materials, but teachers also need easels for charting the thinking and learning during demonstration and inquiry lessons, technology to integrate into lessons as appropriate and for research and publication as students get older. Balanced literacy classrooms in short need all the tools students would need to become immersed in the learning of reading and writing and the use of reading and writing as tools to accumulate and demonstrate knowledge as they grow older.

Dedications & Student Memorials

Over the past four months, district officials have been collaborating with community members, parents and staff to obtain information regarding the many dedications and memorials on both the current high school and middle school sites. This includes reaching out to the family members of individuals who have been remembered through dedications or memorials. The Community Engagement and Strategic Planning Committee of the Board has been working with the student services team in the district to develop a recommendation to take to the full Board regarding the dedications and memorials that are affected by the construction. Conversations over the past four months have included a plan to convert the west interior courtyard into a new outdoor memorial learning space. Based on the 6-12 facilities design, this courtyard, previously inaccessible to students, will have access through the IMC, the project space in the humanities wing, and through the new main entrance corridor which is currently the high school main office. This collaborative planning process for the new space will continue through the 2015-16 school year.

Our district is fortunate to have a talented and dedicated group of citizens who choose to participate in STEP (Senior Tax Exchange Program). This year's group exchanged a total of 819 hours of volunteer time.

Volunteers receive a credit toward payment of their school property taxes in exchange for volunteering in our schools. Who qualifies to participate? The criteria is simple, they must have a desire to work with students, be 62 years of age or older, receive Social Security, and reside in taxable property that they own within the Ripon Area School District.

Most of our volunteers share their time and talents well beyond the limited 85 exchange hours. As a result, our students have the benefit of additional support in their classrooms and volunteers enjoy the satisfaction of helping a child be successful.
